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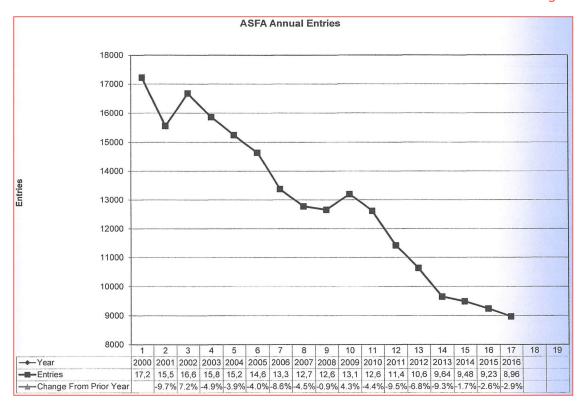

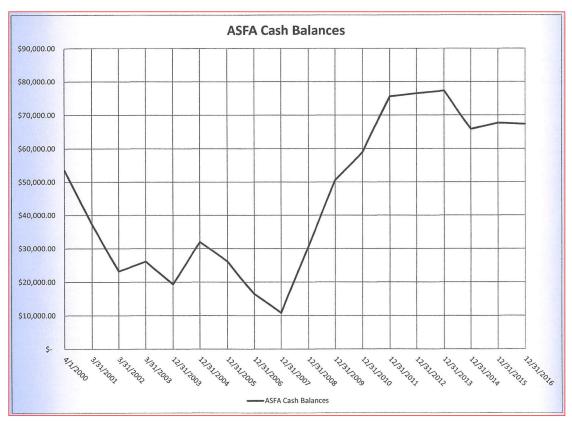

#### Region 7 Regional Directors report 2017 ACOD

As the recently elected RD for Region 7 I have just the basics to report. I want to thank past Region 7 RD Jim Anthony for being such a help to the clubs during his tenure as RD.

Region 7 is comprised of TN, NC, SC, FL, GA, AL, and MS. In 2016 we had 9 clubs which held 36 trials where a total of 1550 hounds competed. This is down from 2015 when we had 14 clubs that held 46 trials and 1618 hounds competed. A couple of the clubs cancelled trials in February and March of 2016, and the usual May trials had one less day of ASFA I believe. We also have one club that only holds one single breed only a trial a year. So even though we had 10 less trials in 2016 that was only a loss of 68 entries. This made us the #3 region for 2016 behind #1 Region 5 and #2 Region 6. The club running the highest total number of hounds for the year was the Greyhound Association of Northern Georgia with 12 trials and 469 dogs for an average of 39 dogs per trial. The club with the highest average per trial was Sunshine State Rhodesian Ridgeback Club with 70 although I have to note that Carolina Lure Coursing Society is a very close second with an average of 64 dogs per trial for their two day January Jam.

Dean asked if we could ask on regional lists was there something that exhibitors/participants would like to see examined or changed. The only exhibitor suggestions that I got were

- a. Require an AKC or ASFA certification even for dogs with racing titles since what is tolerated in racing behavior when the lure stops is much different than what is tolerated in lure coursing, and some dogs want to fight other dogs when the lure stops.
- b. That an ASFA Best In Field be worth whatever the highest points were available for the breeds that actually ran in Best in Field. This is also something that I have proposed and voted for in the past but has been voted down. The exhibitors still want it so I'm going to keep bringing it up.

My own personal wish list would be for ASFA to examine our statement "The American Sighthound Field Association

is an organization of sighthound fanciers

dedicated to the common goal

of preserving and further developing

the natural beauty, grace, speed

and coursing skill of the sighthound.

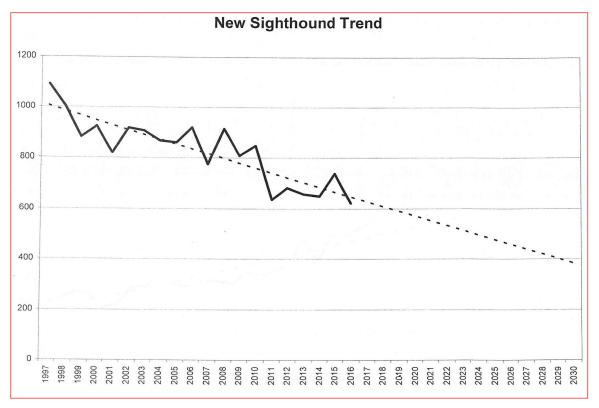

Rich Whritenour moved to limit each speaker in 171 debate to no more than 2 minutes and to alternate speakers on each side as 172 best as possible; motion adopted. 173 Greg Breitbach moved to accept the modifications to Chapter V, Running the 174 *Meet, Section 7,* as shown: 175 First placing hounds in all regular stakes of each breed shall runoff or 176 withdraw from Best of Breed competition. Unless all ties for first place 177 and Best of Breed can be resolved in one course, all ties must be 178 broken before running Best of Breed. Best of Breed competition must 179 be resolved in one course. In the case of multiple flights, an overall 180 winner in the Open stake, an overall winner in the Field Champion

stake, and an overall winner in the Veteran stake must be determined by runoff or forfeiture unless the Best of Breed can be run in one course. Determination of this overall winner shall be determined in the same manner as tie-breaking: namely, all hounds in contention shall be randomly drawn in as many courses as are necessary, and after a single run of each course the high-scoring hound will be considered the overall winner (ties must be forfeited or run-off). The winner of this run or the remaining hound shall be declared that breed's Best of Breed. Only hHounds winning a awarded Best of Breed run either by winning a run-off or by forfeiture shall be awarded points equal to the points awarded the highest-placing hound in that breed which it defeated. In the event of a single entry in any breed, or all hounds in a breed entered in one stake, the Best of Breed winner shall be determined solely by the highest combined scores of the preliminary and final courses. A hound must earn a qualifying score in the runoff in order to win Best of Breed. A hound who wins a Best of Breed run, and who is a single entry in a stake, shall be awarded a first placement with competition.

A hound excused, dismissed or disqualified in a runoff and/or Best of Breed run shall not lose prior points or placements earned that day. A dismissal or disqualification in a runoff and/or Best of Breed run shall count on the hound's record in accordance with Chapter VIII, "Disqualification, Dismissal, and Reinstatement of Hounds".

After debate, **motion lost** by counted vote, 12 ayes and 32 noes.

Rich Whritenour moved to accept the modifications to *Chapter V, Running the Meet, Section 13,* as shown:

At the option of the host club, non-regular stakes may be offered as follows (all entries and awards shall be divided by breed; Singles stake will be considered a single, separate "individual breed" for the purposes of this section):

Note: The following stakes are non-regular stakes which can be offered by the host club at its option. If one or more of these stakes is offered, it is simply noted and winners are determined from their performance in the regular stake. In other words, these are not stakes especially run. They are designed to offer competitors a chance to win special non-regular ribbons or prizes. No points are awarded in any of these stakes.

(a) Kennel stake: For hounds of any individual breed; an entry shall consist of two hounds, designated at time of entry, in one of the regular stakes being owned and kenneled by the same person.

- 221 (b) Breeder stake: For any <u>individual</u> breed which shall have, 222 designated at time of entry, two hounds bred by the same 223 individual.
  - (c) Bench stake: for hounds of any individual breed; an entry shall consist of a single an individual hound with proof on file with the ASFA of a conformation champion title from the AKC, CKC or both or a conformation grand champion title from the UKC.

In all non-regular stakes there will be only one winner per breed with no championship points awarded.

321 322	Report from the President  Jeff Lipps, President
323 324	Welcome to Old Town Omaha. If this meeting is as good as the last time we gathered in Omaha, I look forward to great things coming out of it.
325 326 327 328 329 330 331	As to the last year, I can best describe it as a year of transition. Why do I say that? For several reasons. First, at last year's ACoD, ASFA elected new officers. Of the six officers elected only one, the Recording Secretary, was a holdover from the prior cycle. Admittedly, two other officers were elected to positions they had held previously. That still meant that ASFA had half of the officers assuming positions that they had never held and the learning curve was steep.
332 333 334 335 336	Second, ASFA had chairs of two of its key committees resign: Membership and Judges' Licensing. Once new chairs were selected, Rich Whritenour, Membership, and Greg Breitbach, Judges' Licensing, records had to be transferred and studied. This led to another transition period in those two areas.
337 338 339 340 341	Third, just as sea legs were gained by the new officers, the RD election cycle was upon us. This brought aboard new RDs and presented the ASFA Board with the need to identify and appoint interim RDs for those regions where the incumbent RDs were termed out and no one indicated a desire to fill the position.
342 343 344 345 346	Complicating these transitions was the fact that we are a volunteer organization and the demands of everyone's daily life often limited the attention that could be given to ASFA. The good news, however, is that the year following the election of new officers and RDs is always the year of great promise. And that year is now upon us.
347 348 349 350 351 352 353	We have several important projects underway that will hopefully lead to greater efficiencies and savings for the ASFA, and spark greater enthusiasm for ASFA lure coursing. Specifically, the project to identify and implement a new records program marches forward, and recently the Board approved the creation of an ad hoc committee tasked with a mission to take a fresh look at our record keeping and submission requirements. I have heard many complaints about the onerous nature of our requirements as compared to the

354 other major lure coursing organization and felt now was the time to take a 355 look at these complaints. 356 Last year also saw the emergence of a group of Canadian ASFA lure coursing 357 enthusiasts here who entered a club in the Fast Track Program. They hosted 358 the largest fun trial I ever recall. The club is on the verge of hosting their 359 first ASFA pointed trial. 360 As in any year, there were things that were not accomplished. For example, we have yet to develop tangible long range objectives for the ASFA. Also, the 361 362 search for a new records program has not advanced as fast as many had 363 hoped. Finally, the ASFA Communiqué has not been published in many, 364 many months. I certainly will accept my share of the responsibility in these 365 areas, and pledge to move these projects forward in a more concrete way in 366 the upcoming year. 367 In closing, I wanted to remind everyone that next year's ACoD will be an 368 election year for the ASFA Officers. It is never too early to express an 369 interest in holding one of those positions. And, as always, we desire 370 members of the Fancy expressing interest in and joining ASFA committees. 371 They are the backbone of the ASFA and need a regular infusion of new 372 energy and new ideas. 373 **Report from the First Vice President** 374 Phil Fullam, First Vice President 375 As this is my first time on the board of ASFA, I focused on understanding 376 how the board operates, and learning the Electronic Meeting Procedures. I 377 have attempted to contribute to discussions of motions, and vote on all 378 motions that have come up. 379 During the year, I advocated along with others, for a change in the structure of the Records Coordinator function, and was asked to become the 380 381 Chairperson of the committee. The intent of this is consistent with the need 382 to provide support and direction to a very key function that ASFA provides, 383 timely reporting of trial results and top twenty standings. (More on this in the 384 Records Coordination Committee report.) 385 One area that seems to be underserved currently is support for individuals 386 who have experienced problems or difficulties at ASFA sanctioned events. 387 The mechanisms for individuals to communicate to and receive response 388 from the board are limited. There is also a perception that even if a person 389 reaches out to the board, nothing will come of it. Based on my very small 390 sampling of the fancy, the ASFA is seen as isolated and unresponsive.

391 The coming year offers many challenges, and I hope I can contribute to re-392 invigorating the ASFA. 393 **Report from the Recording Secretary** 394 Joe Shoemaker, Recording Secretary 395 The minutes for the March 2016 Board of Directors meeting were delivered to 396 the prospective chair of the Minutes Review Committee (MRC) on 18 March 397 2016 and, after amendment, approved by the Board of Directors on 27 398 January 2017. 399 The minutes for the 2016 Annual Convention of Delegates (ACoD) were 400 delivered to both the prospective chair of the MRC and the chair of the 2016 401 ACoD Minutes Review Committee (MRC) on 19 March 2016, and, after 402 amendment, were approved by the 2016 ACoD MRC on 6 September 2016. 403 The minutes for the on-line Board of Directors meeting that convened 404 between the 2016 ACoD and the 2017 ACoD will be delivered to the MRC 405 within a day of conclusion of business; hopefully, that will be in time for 406 approval by the Board of Directors at their March 2017 meeting. 407 As I stated in my report last year, I believed that having been through the 408 process and given time to prepare, I would meet the deadlines for drafting 409 the minutes this past year, which were 17 April 2016 for the Board of 410 Directors meeting and 19 May 2016 for the ACoD. I am grateful to both the 411 Board of Directors and the 2016 ACoD for assisting me with meeting those 412 deadlines by ensuring that I had the motions correctly in writing prior to a 413 vote. I urge the Board of Directors and 2017 ACoD to afford me the same courtesy this year. 414 415 Despite the delivery of the minutes to the respective MRCs within the 416 deadlines, approval of both minutes was clearly delayed. With respect to the 417 Board of Directors minutes, I believe that a reminder immediately after 418 appointment and approval of the Board's MRC would have helped maintain 419 focus on the review process. With respect to the ACoD minutes, I believe 420 that naming the members of the ACoD MRC at the earliest opportunity will 421 improve the review and approval process by informing those individuals of 422 their responsibilities at the beginning of the convention rather than near the 423 end. 424 I also promised in my report last year to update the guidelines for the 425 Recording Secretary, which I delivered to the chair of the Guidelines 426 Committee on 20 April 2016.

- 427 Our parliamentary authority is the current edition of Robert's Rules of Order,
- 428 Newly Revised, which recommends that an organization's executive board or
- a committee appointed for the purpose should be authorized to approve the
- 430 minutes when the next regular business session will not be held within a
- 431 quarterly time interval or in an organization in which there will be change or
- replacement of a portion of the membership (refer to RONR (11<sup>th</sup> ed.), p. 474
- 433 II. 31-35 and p. 475, II. 1-7). The intent is that minutes should not languish
- 434 unapproved for an extended period, particularly when the approving body
- 435 (e.g., the 2018 ACoD) could be substantially different in its membership (i.e.,
- delegates) from the body that conducted the business (e.g., the 2017 ACoD).
- 437 In recognition, the 2016 ACoD resolved that each ACoD establish, from its
- delegates, a Minutes Review Committee to review and approve the ACoD
- 439 minutes within 90 days after that ACoD.
- 440 Consequently, I advise the 2017 ACoD to appoint its ACoD Minutes Review
- Committee, to be chaired by the president, who will select committee
- 442 members from the body of delegates, to review and approve the minutes of
- 443 the 2017 ACoD within 90 days after the convention closes. I further advise
- 444 the 2017 ACoD to take that action at its earliest convenience so that the
- 445 members of that committee are fully aware of their responsibilities for the
- 446 duration of the convention.

### 447 Report from the Corresponding Secretary

- 448 Sally MacDowell, Corresponding Secretary
- The very first thing I must say is that I sincerely appreciate all the help,
- 450 hints, and encouragement I have had since I stepped into what Jeff referred
- 451 to as a fast moving stream. Ping, as a predecessor in this Office, provided a
- 452 strong framework in the Guideline and Job Description documents which she
- 453 wrote. She, along with Dean, Marilyn, and Vickie are generous with their time
- 454 when I have questions.
- I have had enlightening exchanges throughout the year with many of you,
- and I could not have come this far without you. Thank you ever so much!
- 457 Statements of Irregularity and Protests
- 458 Two Statements of Irregularity were received; in neither case was there an
- 459 Irregularity. The topics have prompted several fruitful discussions.
- 460 In the first, the writer described a situation in which there was confusion
- about the outcome when a judge dismisses a hound, but the other does not.
- 462 Response has been completed with letters of explanation to those involved.

- The second, involving an incident of dog aggression off the field, is under consideration at the time of this writing.
- Two Protests were received, one with an appeal one not. Neither protest was upheld.

#### 467 Other Correspondence

- 468 I received a few questions from the website which I answered. I found that
- 469 task interesting, and in one case amusing. The writer offered "to write a
- 470 column for our newsletter" to introduce people to the joys of adopting dogs
- 471 from shelters.

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#### 472 Review of Suspended Individuals

- 473 The list of people suspended has not changed this year, they are:

513 514	Report from Region 1 Karen Sanders, Director
515 516 517 518 519 520	Region 1 is working hard promoting and preserving the sport of the coursing hound. We had 7 active clubs and 2 inactive clubs in Region 1 in 2016. We held 22 ASFA trials with a total entry of 684 hounds and the clubs represented the sport with grace, enthusiasm and great sportsmanship. The one thing you can almost always see is the help each breed extends to the other breeds while still being competitive.

Thank you, Lori Coulson for the statistics. 573 CLCA had the honor of running more Borzoi than any other club in 2016.

574 575	Region 3 had a total of 27 trials, including the 42 <sup>nd</sup> Grand National, running a total of 643 hounds.
576 577	The Region 3 Invitational was held on December 4 <sup>th</sup> by the Lobo Lure Coursing Club in New Mexico and had 23 great running hounds.
578 579 580	It appears that the same number of trials will be held in Region 3 with the addition of the American Whippet Club's specialty in April in the Denver area. It will hopefully have a good entry due to the central location in the US.
581 582 583	Fortunately, there is plenty of opportunity to run in an ASFA trial in Region 3. However, it is my goal to work on increasing the number of entries into these trials.
584 585	Report from Region 5 Kent Standerford, Director

While NCA was the host club, the weekend wouldn't have been a 610 success without all the support from EVERY club in our region. And all of us 611 in Region 5 very much appreciate the help that came to Iowa from across the 612 entire country. We had huntmasters from Idaho to Florida, lure operators 613 from Florida to Colorado, and clerks from across the whole country making it 614 a beautiful weekend. 615 And lastly, I want to welcome each and every one of you to our ACoD from 616 the folks here in the heartland. 617 Report from Region 6 618 Greg Breitbach, Director 619 The 2016 Region 6 Invitational was held in Avon, Ohio and hosted by Loraine 620 Area Racing Klub (LARK) on September 24. There were 52 entries and the 621 BIF was Whippet Gossip. 622 The 2017 Region 6 invitational will be held on Saturday November 11. It will 623 be hosted by ILCC at the model airplane field in Muncie, IN. 624 We are down to eight active clubs. These clubs hosted 42 trials with 1,661 625 entries for an average of 40 dogs per trial. 626 As with other regions, we have an abundance of other dog activities which 627 compete for entries. 676 677 678 679 680 681 682	Region 9 includes New York, Connecticut, Massachusetts, Rhodes Island, New Hampshire, Vermont & Maine with 3 active member clubs consisting of CLASS, GONE & LCLC and is bordered by Region 6 & 8. Unfortunately, we have 2 clubs, NERRC with a change in leadership who prefers holding AKC events, and PHONE not participating in ASFA due to the lack of a timely response concerning their inquiry about the 2014 end of the year West Coast ASFA Breed Specialty Trial.
683 684 685 686 687 688 689	On a better note, the NAA Ontario Club (as an extension of Region 9) applied for ASFA membership. The reasoning is that they truly enjoy coursing under ASFA and that this will allow them to participate without having to cross borders. In 2016, they held an ASFA fun trial with an amazing entry of 23 hounds and were approved as an affiliate club by the ASFA Membership Chair. Following their fun trial, they applied and were approved by the Scheduling Chair to hold an ASFA AB trial on May 27th & 28th 2017 in Emvale Ontario.
691 692 693 694 695 696	As ASFA Region 9 Director, I made it a point during the 2016 coursing season to attend several scheduled trials per club so we could discuss member concerns & ideas to increase hound attendance at ASFA lure coursing trials. One major concern was the lack of participants getting involved at trials. After preaching this for a number of years, I am happy to report that in 2016 GONE members finally stepped up to help at trials.
697 698 699 700 701 702 703	At GONE's annual meeting held on January 28, 2017 we agreed to host the 2017 ASFA Region 9 Invitational on Saturday, October 14 <sup>th</sup> at the Kinnie Farm in Connecticut, which has been approved by the Scheduling Chair. I will continue to work with my Region 9 Club members in finding ways to invite new judges to our region. Unfortunately, most of the time it's cost prohibitive for a club to do so, so if anyone has any suggestions we welcome any suggestions!

704 In 2015, Region 9 held 15 trials with 3 clubs participating for a total entry of 705 616, and I'm happy to report that in 2016 Region 9 held 19 trials for a total 706 entry of 692 or a .9% increase over the previous year. This is 7.7% of 707 ASFA's total 2016 entry of 8,967. 708 Trials held per club: 709 CLASS 6 trials 710 • GONE 7 trials LCLC 4 trials 711 712 SDCA & NAA 1 trial each 713 Looking forward to seeing everyone at the 2017 ACoD. 714 **Report from Region 10** 715 Lori Silvestri, Director 716 Region 10 covers the State of California south from the northern boundaries 717 of San Luis Obispo, Kern and San Bernardino counties, Arizona, Hawaii, and 718 Nevada south of Highway 6. 719 2016 saw a significant increase in entries in Region 10, following a couple of 720 years of decline. Region 10 is currently facing a number of challenges, 721 including a multi-year decline in the number of ASFA clubs (who mostly 722 chose to host only AKC trials from then on), a loss of available fields due to 723 drought and other challenges. We are happy to see progress and growth in 724 spite of these challenges. 725 Region 10 currently has 2 member clubs, 1 National Breed Club, and 2 726 Affiliate clubs. 2016 will hopefully see an increase in the number of all-breed member clubs in region 10, with Central Coast Association of Sighthounds 727 728 (CCASH) in Paso Robles, CA, having applied for Member club status in 729 January. The Central Coast generally has mild weather all year, and CCASH 730 has a large number of long-time ASFA enthusiasts as members, so CCASH 731 should be a welcome addition to the ASFA region 10 family. CCASH has to 732 date only hosted two to three trials per year, with the limiting factor being 733 the lack of a large field due to the drought conditions on California's central 734 coast. We are hoping that the heavy rains this winter will alleviate the 735 drought concerns and allow us greater freedom in selecting a field. 736 Our most active club in Region 10 has long been California Coursing

Association CCA, a club that has recovered beautifully, and continues to grow

and set an example for others after being treated inappropriately by other

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- fanciers a couple of years ago. CCA has for many years been a source of
- 740 training and support for new clubs and lure coursing enthusiasts, providing
- 741 equipment and mentoring for anyone seriously interested in learning various
- aspects of the sport. In 2016, CCA had a total of 221 entries, up from 90 in
- 743 2015. CCA hosted 21 trials in 2016, up from 19 in 2015. Having previously
- 744 hosted multiple ASFA Specialty trials in conjunction with AKC trials in recent

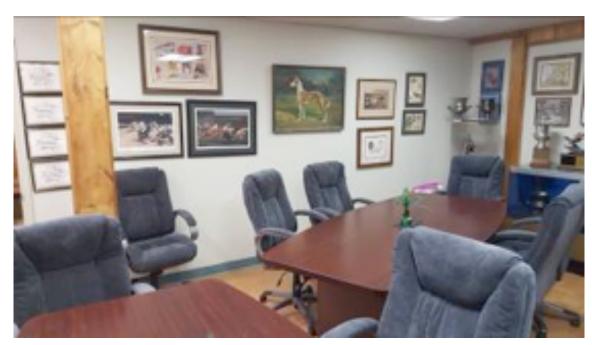

If your trophy didn't come with a shipping container, please go to UPS or other shipping store and have them pack and ship the trophy, this will avoid damage. Be sure not to use foam "peanuts" for packaging because these tend to blow around on the field when the trophies are unpacked.

b. Follow up with everyone that has indicated the trophy will be 1222 1223 shipped, for you to receive a tracking number and mention that 1224 the shipment should be insured! 1225 c. The winners who have designated another person to deliver the 1226 trophy to the I.I. must provide their direct contact information 1227 (phone, email, etc.) to you. 1228 **d.** For potential attendees, create a tickler system in your calendar 1229 to send out follow ups to see whether their plans have changed 1230 and need to ship the trophy to you. Lastly, follow up should 1231 take place three weeks before the event. 1232 e. If some of the contact information for the trophy recipient is 1233 outdated or has changed, the Club where the person belongs to might be helpful, or Social Media, i.e. Facebook, Instagram etc. 1234 1235 might help establishing communication to the trophy holder. 1236 2. Keep track of your information in an Excel spreadsheet if you have 1237 access to this program or any other software that can be updated and 1238 sorted easily. This will surely help you stay organized with the 1239 multitude of replies and updated information regarding the return of 1240 the trophies. Thomas, it might be a good idea to include a template for this with the guidelines. Much easier if a new trophy chair doesn't have 1241 to reinvent the wheel. 1242 1243 3. If you are planning on attending a lure coursing event, mention it in 1244 your email to the current winners to offer a personal meeting to have 1245 the trophy delivered to you. 1246 **Evaluation of the Trophies:** 1247 1. Survey the trophies you have received and note the damages and or 1248 necessary repairs that can be determined and notify ASFA Board of 1249 Directors promptly. 2. Check the boxes/crates for wear and tear and inspect the packaging 1250 1251 material. If there is not ample bubble wrap or convoluted foam, make 1252 a note to inform ASFA Board of Directors. 1253 3. The ASFA Board of Directors should be notified when you have 1254 recorded all the damages/space limitations for the name plates at least 1255 3 months prior to the I.I. event to have ample time to discuss and 1256 vote on a budget. This includes giving the ASFA board an estimate for 1257 the repair of the damages.

Only hounds winning a awarded 1392 Best of Breed run either by winning a run-off or by forfeiture shall be 1393 awarded points equal to the points awarded the highest-placing hound 1394 in that breed which it defeated. In the event of a single entry in any 1395 breed, or all hounds in a breed entered in one stake, the Best of Breed 1396 winner shall be determined solely by the highest combined scores of 1397 the preliminary and final courses. A hound must earn a qualifying 1398 score in the runoff in order to win Best of Breed. A hound who wins a 1399 Best of Breed run, and who is a single entry in a stake, shall be 1400 awarded a first placement with competition. 1401 A hound excused, dismissed or disqualified in a runoff and/or Best of 1402 Breed run shall not lose prior points or placements earned that day. A 1403 dismissal or disqualification in a runoff and/or Best of Breed run shall count on the hound's record in accordance with Chapter VIII, 1404 1405 "Disqualification, Dismissal, and Reinstatement of Hounds". 1406 Effect: To allow any hound awarded best of breed to win points equal 1407 to the highest amount awarded in that breed.

**Reason:** To avoid situations where additional points are denied to a stake winner by refusal to run best of breed.

The REC makes no recommendation on this proposal.

#### (2) Chapter V, Running the Meet

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**Section 13**. At the option of the host club, non-regular stakes may be offered as follows (all entries and awards shall be divided by breed; Singles stake will be considered a single, separate "individual breed" for the purposes of this section):

Note: The following stakes are non-regular stakes which can be offered by the host club at its option. If one or more of these stakes is offered, it is simply noted and winners are determined from their performance in the regular stake. In other words, these are not stakes especially run. They are designed to offer competitors a chance to win special non-regular ribbons or prizes. No points are awarded in any of these stakes.

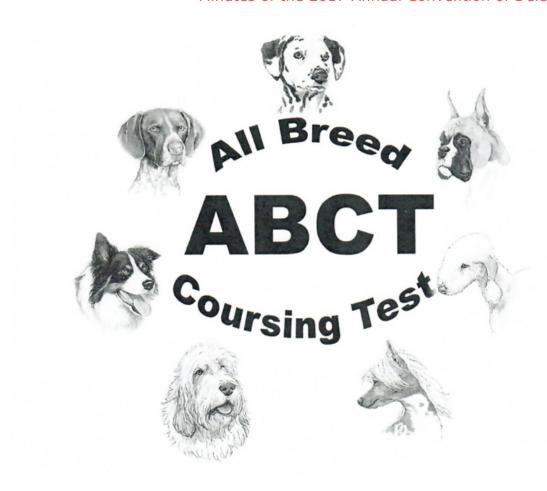
- (a) Kennel stake: For hounds of any individual breed; an entry shall consist of two hounds, designated at time of entry, in one of the regular stakes being owned and kenneled by the same person.
- (b) Breeder stake: For any <u>individual</u> breed which shall have, designated at time of entry, two hounds bred by the same individual.

1429 1430 1431 1432 1433 1434 1435	(c) Bench stake: for hounds of any individual breed; an entry shall consist of a single an individual hound with proof on file with the ASFA of a conformation champion title from the AKC, CKC or both or a conformation grand champion title from the UKC. 1436 1437	<b>Effect:</b> To allow Singles stake hounds the opportunity to compete in their own non-regular stakes.
